## **President's Words**

\*In 1971 the magazine, *ArtNews*, published an essay whose title posed a question that would spearhead an entirely new branch of art history. The essay — "Why Have There Been No Great Women Artists?" — explored possible reasons why "greatness" in artistic accomplishment has been reserved for male geniuses such as Michelangelo. Nochlin argued that general social expectations against women seriously pursuing art, restrictions on educating women at art academies, and "the entire romantic, elitist, individual-glorifying, and monograph-producing substructure upon which the profession of art history is based " have systematically precluded the emergence of great women artists.

\*And so with the following, one could argue that history still -- yes still -- repeats itself. To wit: the Dec. 8, 2011 issue of *Rolling Stone Magazine* that arrived in my mailbox recently. So you know the drill, the magazine assembled a panel of fifty-eight judges composed of "top guitarists and other experts" to rank their favorites and explain the legends to everyone else. So would you like to take a guess just how many of those judges on the panel were women? Four. That's right...Rolling Stone could only identify/find four women to participate in judging for their vaunted ranking. Here are a few more data points. The first woman guitarist enters the ranking at #75, Joni Mitchell. The next one is Bonnie Raitt coming in at #89. There are only two women in the entire list of 100.

Ok, so it looks like I'm not alone in my stunned outrage. Washington Post writer David Segal wrote a commentary on this very problem in 2004. Rolling Stone published a list of the 100 greatest guitarists of all time then too and just two women made the cut: Joan Jett and Joni Mitchell. That's right: again 98 men, 2 women. The weird part is how un-outrageous it seemed, how little debate it sparked. Even now... where's the outrage? Segal writes, "Any list of the greatest actors or singers or novelists that was so male-dominated would be ridiculed, and for good reason. Instead back in 2004, Van Halen fans seethed that Jack White of the White Stripes landed higher on the list than Eddie."

Well, I'll tell you I AM outraged. I'm laying down my marker. Kelley Deal, lead guitarist of the Breeders, doesn't buy the notion of no great women guitarists. Quoted in Elle magazine's coverage of the issue back in 2009 she said, "I think we do exist, but in a different capacity. Guys really like to hear themselves talk. Women guitarists seem more song-oriented. What they choose to play contributes to making the song better, not just riffing all over it. It's a deeper relationship." This is the time for AAUW members to know there are great women guitarists. For instance, Mary Ford was married to and played with Les Paul, the inventor of the modern electric guitar. Lots of people know Paul's jazz/pop work, but they don't know that Ford could match him note for note. Sharon Isbin is a great classical player and she's a **department chair at Juilliard**, so...you know, you gotta figure they know what they're doing. Elle magazine came up with a nice list of 12 of the greatest female electric guitar players to ever pick up the instrument back in 2009. Check it out. While you're at it, take a listen to some of them then go get in your car, head out for a latte and crank your Joan Jett tune outta the windows of your safe and sedate sedan. Celebrate! After all, on September 27th, 2011, it was announced that Jett is a nominee for induction to the Rock And Roll Hall of Fame's class of 2012.


