Elections of officers for **2015-2016** will be held at the **Branch Meeting, March 21, 2015**. There are 5 positions up for election. All of them are 2 year terms and each offers an opportunity for you to join the branch leadership. THINK ABOUT IT. The Governance Committee—Dorothy McBride, Connie Dunkelberger, and Marilee Titus—serves as the nominating committee for the branch. If someone asks you to participate, be attentive and helpful! PRESIDENT

This office represents the branch to the outside world and has the power to appoint standing committee chairs and special committees and task forces. The President(s) preside at meetings of both the branch and the Board of Directors. Two years ago, two new members of the branch stepped up and volunteered to share the Presidency of the branch and they've done a terrific job. Ask either **Diane or Dana** about how they divided up their duties and their experiences and recommendations.

PROGRAM VICE PRESIDENT

This is a job that definitely can be shared by two or more. The Program VP (s) are responsible for planning branch monthly programs from September to May. If several wanted to form a "program team", each member could plan just one or two meetings. The Program VP is a two year term and a member of the board.

TREASURER/FINANCE OFFICER

The Finance Officer leads the way by maintaining the branch accounts, proposing the annual budget, and disbursing funds as directed by the branch and the board. This job is at the heart of branch operations.

The Governance and Development Committee is composed of 3 members elected by the branch. The committee keeps the bylaws and procedures up to date and serves as the nominating committee. The chair of the committee serves on the Board. Connie and Dorothy are rotating off the committee this year leaving opportunities to others to learn about all aspects of branch activities.

The morning starts with a panel, "Women in the Workforce, in Politics, in the Legislature, and in Education: Progress toward Equity" with Liz Berry, Washington Women's Political Caucus President, Kim Mead, Washington Education Association, President, Mia Gregerson 33rd Legislative District Representative and Mayor, SeaTac, and Cheryl Sesnon Jubilee Women's Center, Executive Director.

Then Washington State Superintendent of Public Instruction Randy Dorn will speak about "Education Priorities, McCleary Decision and the Priorities in the Legislature for 2015: What's the Emerging Agenda?" Then AAUW's lobbyist will talk about AAUW's public policy priorities and how to effectively lobby your legislators.

Expanding Our Reach through Mission Grants

Do you have an idea about ways to break barriers to equality for women and girls in Pierce County? Such as, a special research project, a mentoring program, an arts competition, assistance for victims of sexual assault, a STEM project, a scholarship for a lone mother seeking economic self-sufficiency? Perhaps you would like us to support a research project to find out more about the status of women and girls in our area. Or, do you know about a great program that helps women prepare for college and think the branch could help?

The membership will choose the projects that the branch will fund in 2015-2016 at the annual meeting in March. If you have a great idea for how we can best

use our mission budget (around \$5000 each year) to promote our goals, please submit it to co-Presidents Dana Holt and Diane Palmquist by **February 1, 2015**.

Here are the guidelines for your proposal:

- *Any member or group of members may propose uses for the funds to the Board for recommendation to the membership. Any proposed project must show how the project advances the branch mission and must designate a committee, task force or individual to implement the project.
- **Leaders of each project will report the results to the membership before the end of the fiscal year in which the money was allocated.


