## <u>State Legislature</u>

The 2016 Washington State Legislature convened on January 11<sup>th</sup> for a 60-day session. Within this time frame legislators need to pass a supplemental budget reflecting any adjustments that need to be made to the 2-year budget they passed last session. In addition, in 2016 legislators face significant policy challenges, including trying to come to consensus on how to adequately fund our K-12 education system and



overcome other budget constraints. Accomplishing all of this within a "short session"

could be rather challenging as the Legislature remains closely divided with the Democrats controlling the House (50-48) and the Majority Coalition Caucus retaining control of the Senate (26-23).

## Tech Trek

## WE CAN SEND MORE GIRLS TO TECH TREK!

What is Tech Trek? It's a week-long residential STEM camp for 7<sup>th</sup> grade girls. Sponsored by AAUW and AAUW Washington State, Tech Trek has engaged over 25 branches that select and pay the expenses of local middle school girls, ensuring them a life-changing experience that engages their interest in science and math and sets them on a path for success in education and careers. The Western Washington camp is in our backyard—at Pacific Lutheran University.

Tacoma AAUW has helped girls to attend Tech Trek since the first camp: 6 in 2013, 11 in 2014, and 15 in 2015. There is great satisfaction seeing the immediate

effects of our hard work raising funds and recruiting campers.

It costs \$900 to sponsor one girl for Tech Trek. At present, our branch has \$7200, including \$2500 from branch mission funds, which will support eight campers. But we CAN send more. The Tech Trek committee would like to choose at least 10 girls for the 2016 camp. We need to raise \$1800.

Won't you help? Any amount would be welcome; many branch members have donated in the past.

# AAUW Tacoma Branch Grant to PLU for the 2016 "Elect Her" Workshop

At the October 5, 2015 board meeting, the Board agreed to award up to \$1500 to PLU for the 2016 "Elect Her" Program. Due to recent cutbacks in enrollment at PLU, changes have been happening campus-wide since the new President, Thomas Krise, arrived in 2012. The university experienced a 5% budget shortage from 2013-2014. Budgets were tightened again in 2014-2015. The pain continues this academic year. President Krise has stated to the student newspaper that the root cause of the funds shortage has to do with and recent tuition reductions at popular state universities in the area, made possible by increased state funding in the last two budget cycles.

Our state currently fails to fully fund the State Need Grant, a funding source that has been vitally important to the PLU budget. As a result of this cut, PLU backfills any unmet need for its eligible students. Last year, that backfill amounted to \$1.7 million in university institutional funds invested to make up for the state's inability to fund students who qualify for the help.

The impact of this to PLU Women's Center has been felt. It has meant budget cutting all around at PLU, with every part of the institution feeling the loss. The operational budget for the PLU Women's Center, one of the few non-violence related programs on campus, dropped from \$6,000 in the 2014-2015 year to \$4,320 in the current year. Women's

Center Director and fellow branch member, Jennifer Smith, has informed us the annual "Elect Her" event is a strategic and marquee program at PLU. Your Tacoma branch board agrees.

Given the strategic value of "Elect Her" for women students -- the unique way it builds our branch relationship along with access to local women leaders in their role as elected officials, its continuing contributions to branch recruitment efforts, and our strong historical relationship with PLU -- the board authorized the Finance Officer to respond to a request up to \$1500 for the 2015-2016 year, from reserves, pending a participatory funding decision from the PLU student government association. As a precondition of this funding we required "presenting sponsor" status for the event and creatively "amped" campus publicity. I will attend the March 5, 2016 "Elect Her" event, and I look forward to returning to the branch with a detailed report on the success of the day's workshop and key takeaways.


