PRESIDENT'S NOTE

April 2018

Women's History Month draws to a close on the March page of 2018's calendar, but not in the hearts, minds, and lives of women, especially not AAUW members. 2017-2018 will go done in history for so many unjust things affecting women, people of color, wage workers and immigrants.

Just three days ago marked the anniversary of the notorious Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire on March 25, 1911.

The tragic outcome was no accident. In 1909, women workers at the factory organized with the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union and went on strike to demand higher wages and a shorter workweek. In response, the factory owners, Max Blanck and Isaac Harris, hired strikebreakers and paid off the local police to arrest and sometimes violently attack the women. After that strike, which affected garment workers across the city, several local factories had struck a deal for a 52-hour work week, but Blanck and Harris had refused to meet the union's demands, which is why about 600 people were still working on Saturday afternoon, March 25, 1911, towards their 56th hour.

On the bosses' orders, the doors of the factory were kept locked. When fire broke out, due to a lack of exits, the victims, the majority of whom were immigrant Jewish women, were unable to escape the rising flames. Some died inside. Others jumped. 146 perished.

"120,000 people marched in the funeral procession and another 230,000 people watched the march. In criminal court, the all-male jurors acquitted the company owners of manslaughter because they lacked concrete proof of negligent working conditions; later, the owners settled civil suits and paid \$75 per victim. Since Harris and Blanck had insured the factory against loss, they collected \$400 per victim, but never paid any part of that to the survivors or heirs to those who died." msmagazine.com/the fire that changed everything

Do you hear the horrible echo, reverberating against current events?

It is important to remember that while the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire was the bonfire that (finally) ignited the public, women workers had been actively working for reforms, through strikes and unionizing, since the 1800's.

"Among the estimated 10,000 people who gathered to watch the fire as it burned at the Triangle Shirtwaist factory was Frances Perkins (1880-1965), who later became Secretary of Labor under President Franklin D. Roosevelt. She was the first woman to hold a Cabinet post. Perkins had already been actively lobbying to lower the workweek for women and children to "only" 54 hours and giving street-corner speeches arguing for women's suffrage. The Triangle Shirtwaist Fire was a turning point for her personally. It was, she said, 'seared on my mind as well as my heart—a never-to-be-forgotten reminder of why I had to spend my life fighting conditions that could permit such a tragedy."" (op.cit)

What's the message of the Triangle fire? That women, immigrants, minorities, and those paid the very least, be they hospitality workers, factory workers, or farm laborers, deserve safe working conditions.

But again, what's the message of the Triangle fire? The meta-message is this: that protest for social change is never in vain, but it can seem that way until a tragedy or a revelation fuels those sparks of discontent into a bonfire to burn down the *ancien regime*.

This spring our branch will have the opportunity to hear from a daughter of that organizing legacy: Patty Rose, Secretary Treasurer of the Pierce County Central Labor Council, AFL-CIO, will be our guest at the MAY Branch luncheon. I look forward to seeing you there.

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LEGISLATIVE UPDATE 2018: PUTTING WOMEN OF WASHINGTON FIRST

The Bill Package signed by Gov. Jay Inslee 3/21/2018 includes:

Equal Pay Opportunity Act: Addresses workplace practices to promote gender pay equity. Institutes penalties for wage discrimination and offering lessor opportunities based on gender. Prohibits employers from retaliating against employees who discuss their rate of pay/ benefits with other employees.

Reproductive Parity Act: Requires almost all health plans to cover all types of reproductive health care without cost sharing. Requires ALL health plans that cover maternity care to cover abortion services.

Sexual Harassment Prevention

<u>Senate Bill 5996</u>: Encourages disclosure and discussion of sexual harassment and sexual assault in the workplace.

<u>Senate Bill 6313:</u> Preserves employee's right to publicly file a complaint or cause of action.

<u>Senate Bill 6471:</u> Relates to developing model policies to create workplaces that are safe from sexual harassment.

FINDING THE HUMANITIES IN STEM

A Business Meeting discussion raised the question if our branch efforts on Tech Trek inadequately address the role of humanities in education.

Humanities and STEM are not mutually exclusive. A woman reads, writes and presents to pursue a competitive STEM career. As evidenced by various and sundry crime fiction, plays and movies, a good dose of science comprehension by the "humanities" oriented author results in a more compelling narrative.

Tech Trek features a healthy dose of applied humanities. Girls keep daily journals. They make oral presentations in class, to visitor groups and when they serve as ambassadors for Tech Trek after camp. They teach their robots to dance in time with the music. An "Art Through Nature" core course has Trekkers making and using paints from fruits. To enhance their understanding of design, they practice observing the visual beauty and symmetry of nature in objects collected outdoors (blossoms, leaves, stems, sticks, bugs, soil).

" AAUW was involved in the crafting of the UDHR and the creation of the United Nations itself from the beginning. Less than two months after the end of World War II in September 1945, 50 nations and 40 organizations, including AAUW under the intrepid leadership of <u>Virginia</u> <u>Gildersleeve</u>, Ph.D., came together to establish the United Nations. This new organization would succeed the <u>League of Nations</u>, an earlier, ineffective version of the UN that failed to prevent the onset of World War II.

The drafting committee of the declaration, chaired by <u>Eleanor Roosevelt</u>, worked with the UN Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) and AAUW CSW representatives like Dorothy Kenyon, J.D., to ensure that the rights of women and girls were represented in the document. AAUW is still present at the UN today working to advance the rights of women and girls."

When does a moment become a **MOVEMENT**? Organized by young people, in Tacoma, an estimated 1,000 marched to voice their demands to end gun violence, not only in schools, but also when directed at communities of color.

Concurrently at the Capitol in Olympia, the 4800+ attendees heard articulate, passionate student speakers (four young women, one young man) including one who huddled at North Thurston HS waiting for the next minutes of her life as a gun was shot off in the school courtyard in 2015.

That shooter was tackled by a Teacher who was the only "adult" speaker. Voter registration was an additional activity on the 24th.
